years old, the pun-tastic lines from Y5 that were wonderfully interwoven with a serious message, and of course the West End standard production of the numbers from our upper school. I was lost for words and in awe of what they had all achieved in such a short space of time. I hope that you enjoyed it as much as I did and are looking forward to the Christmas productions at the end of the term.



While we were off enjoying ourselves over half term, the school was still a hive of activity. I want to recognise the tremendous efforts that our site team put in to keeping our school looking lovely, but particular mention to Mr Andrews who has been tasked with 'projects'. Our key message to our children this year is that Hutton Manor is 'Going Green' and children discussed all the different things that this entails: being more eco-friendly, outdoor learning, enjoying nature, thinking about climate change, green for 'go' - ready to learn, personal growth, getting to green in our zones of regulation, and 'being more Willow' as was mentioned by one rather proud member of Willow House. With that in mind, I wanted to share with you that our maintenance team are also part of our 'Going Green' pledge and I can now share that all the equipment they now use around the school is battery powered rather than petrol.
